OVERVIEW

The Halifax Peace With Women Fellowship's mission is both ambitious and attainable: to advance women's leadership in international security. In March 2022, Halifax International Security Forum (HFX) welcomed the fourth cohort of Peace With Women Fellows, whose program was postponed from 2022 due to the pandemic. Twelve esteemed officers from 11 NATO member and partner countries embarked on a 22-day intensive program. In November, they will join the forthcoming fifth cohort of Fellows and program alumnae at the 2022 Halifax International Security Forum in Nova Scotia, Canada.

Notably, the March program began immediately following Vladimir Putin's illegal invasion of Ukraine, providing a critical real-world scenario to advance and test the Fellows learning. Throughout the March program, participants engaged with a multitude of experts and decision-makers representing the constellation of organizations and sectors active in the international security space and on the cutting edge of emerging technology trends.

Stakeholders, observers, and the Fellows themselves all said that the program far exceeded their expectations. HFX continues to facilitate the development of the knowledge and networks of its participants to make them even more effective leaders for their organizations across the NATO Alliance.

PROGRAM

On March 9, 2022, the class gathered in Washington, DC. They spent the subsequent three weeks travelling to Silicon Valley, Ottawa, and Toronto.

The Fellowship's design intentionally drew from diverse sectors, including defense, science and technology, government, media, academia, think tanks, and civil society. In keeping with HFX's goal of advancing a modern vision of security, the Fellowship aimed to extend its focus beyond the traditional definitions of domestic and international security. The Appendix to this report lists the full complement of meetings that took place during the March Fellowship.

The engagements were primarily structured as off-the-record and discussion-based in order to promote open and transparent conversations. The Fellowship curriculum featured the intersectionality of four key areas: China, Climate, Gender Perspectives, and the COVID-19 Pandemic. During each meeting, Fellows and guest speakers explored the interplay and security dimensions of these themes with the subject matter being discussed.

The highlight of the March 2022 program was meeting with Canada's Minister of National Defence, Anita Anand. Minister Anand led a wide-ranging conversation on matters related to international security and women in the military. Notably, Canada's Vice-Chief of the Defence Staff, Lieutenant-General Frances Allen, the first woman to hold the position in the Canadian Armed Forces, joined the meeting and provided important perspective to the discussion; Deputy Minister of National Defence Bill Matthews and Associate Deputy Minister Stefanie Beck also joined the meeting.

PARTICIPANTS

Twelve leaders hailed from NATO member and partner countries, including four new participating countries: Denmark, the Slovak Republic, Spain and Switzerland. Once again, the program included all members of the Five Eyes intelligence alliance: Australia, Canada, New Zealand, the United Kingdom and the United States.

IMPACT

The Fellowship followed its successful curriculum model that expands participants' understanding of international security through an intersectional approach that goes beyond traditional military education to include emerging technological and societal trends, taking into account Fellows' specific interests as well.

Key areas covered in more than 40 engagements during the March Fellowship included:

- The future role of strategic alliances, multilateral institutions, independent security organizations, and global security institutions (both formal and informal).
- Gender roles specifically related to the role of women in armed conflicts, security, and peacekeeping; the evolution of policies and the danger of securitizing gender; and masculinity and armed conflict.
- Leadership in conflict zones and management of human capital. In addition, how strategic culture can influence national security challenges and how cognitive bias can impact national level decision making.
- Policies related to regional areas including the Arctic and outer space.
- Public-private partnerships for military infrastructure investment.

The program also addressed how the pandemic is shifting the paradigm of the defense community's approach to all of the above topics.

More than just a substantive learning experience, the Peace With Women Fellowship program created strong bonds between the participants, provided space to examine and grow their own leadership, and expanded their network of experts and decision-makers that they can then bring to bear in their work.

The Fellow from the United Kingdom, Colonel Victoria Moorhouse, was featured in a March 28 news story from the British Army, in which she described the significant positive impacts of the Fellowship:

"I have had an insight into the strategic policy making institutions across North America and looked at ideas from industry, third sector and other organisations, all of which has given insight and an alternate view and way of thinking. I also now have an alumni network across the Halifax Security Forum that I have no doubt will benefit me and the Army in due course. Finally, I have had the opportunity to spend time with an inspiring group of women and had a lot of fun and laughs along the way on our wonderful journey." ALUMNAE

With each new class completing the program, the global Fellowship Alumnae Network continues to expand, and alumnae continue to rise in the ranks. Among the now 41 Fellows in the network, 13 are ranked as general officers. Of the 13, seven were promoted after their participation in the Fellowship. In total, HFX proudly counts 17 stars among Fellowship alumnae.
